New Additions to the Administration

We welcomed Kerri Bowden and Stephanie Gale Winterer as our newest Council members this January. I want to thank Marcia Merritt for serving the last eleven years on council and heading our initiative to restart our recycling program. She put in countless hours of phone calls, and we could not have gotten this done without her.

Bob Ranallo has agreed to stay on as a member of the Planning & Zoning Commission and the Architectural Board of Review, and Tom Talty is the latest addition to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

Village Finances

The Village continues to face headwinds on a budgetary basis and are projecting deficits into the foreseeable future. In addition to the eroding effects of inflation on our expenses, the Village is facing further cuts to the Local Government Fund, which provides 10 percent of our income. At one point this funding source accounted for a third of our revenue. I will be providing you with greater details about the Village's financial picture over the next several months. My goal is to make the Village a self-sustaining entity. We can no longer count on the revenue we have received in the past from the state or county. We are evaluating options and working to develop a plan that will best serve the Village in the long term.

Property Maintenance and Removal of Dead Trees/Limbs

Now that spring has officially arrived, I'm asking residents to be pro-active with the up-keep of their property and removing dead trees/limbs that are near our roads and power lines. Police Chief Carl Dondorfer and Service Director, Bob Haynik, will be evaluating buildings, landscaping and fences that require maintenance. They will also be marking dead trees that pose a risk to power lines and the public's safety. We have had some near misses just in the last couple of months of dead trees collapsing on our roads.

From the Office of the Chief of Police Carl H. Dondorfer

Greetings, Residents of Waite Hill!

Well, we are finally out of the cold wintery weather and hopefully headed into warmer spring temperatures. I hope you are all well. The Village Voice gives me the opportunity to connect with and keep our residents informed on certain important aspects of law enforcement. In this instance, it's a current trend plaguing the profession.

Law Enforcement has continued to be confronted with Internet-based crimes to defraud and scam people across the globe. I felt it very important to inform our residents in the Village of the most common ways criminals reveal your personal information in an effort to commit their crimes. Phishing is the most common way criminals gather personal information.

Phishing is when scammers use email or text messages to try and steal your passwords, account numbers, and or social security numbers. If they get the information, they could get access to your email, bank, or other accounts. They could even sell your information to other scammers. Scammers launch thousands of phishing attacks like these every day in hopes that they are successful, and often times they are. Scammers often update their tactics to keep up with the latest news or trends, but here are some common tactics used in phishing emails or text messages.

Phishing emails and text messages often tell a story to trick you into clicking on a link or opening an attachment. You might get an unexpected email or text message that looks like it's from a company you know or trust, like a bank or credit card or utility company. Or maybe it's from an online payment website or app. The message could be from a scammer who might:

- Say they've noticed some suspicious activity or log-in attempts
- Claim there's a problem with your account or your payment information
- Say you need to confirm some personal or financial information
- Include an invoice you don't recognize
- Want you to click on a link to make a payment
- Say you're eligible to register for a government refund
- Offer a coupon for free stuff

While real companies might communicate with you by email, legitimate companies won't email or text with a link to update your payment information. Phishing emails can often have real consequences for people who give scammers their information, including identity theft.

Criminals are even using political polling as a means of Phishing. You can get a call and or text from someone claiming to be conducting a political survey. The pollster wants to ask you questions about the upcoming election and in exchange for a few minutes of your time and your opinions they promise you a free gift card or other reward. After distracting you with several questions, the caller typically asks you to provide your credit card number and allegedly will tell you that you need to pay for the shipping and taxes of a prize that you have won. This is a SCAM. Do not provide your credit card number and or personal information to persons you are not familiar with over the phone. Scammers may attempt to gain you information for fraudulent charges and identity theft. Legitimate polling companies do not offer prizes for participating in a survey and NONE would ever ask for a credit card number.

So how can you protect yourself from Phishing Attacks?

- Protect your computer by using security software. Set the software to update automatically so it will address any new security threats.
- Protect your cell phone by setting software to update automatically. These updates could give you critical protection against new security threats.
- Protect your account by using multi-factor authentication. Some accounts offer extra security requiring two or more credentials to log in to your account
- Protect your data by backing it up. Back up the data on your computer to an external hard drive or in the cloud and also back up the data on your phone also.

If you think you clicked on a link or opened an attachment that downloaded harmful software, update your computer's security software and then run a scan and remove anything it identifies as a problem. And always remember if you don't recognize the email and or sender delete the email and do not click any attachments.

By paying attention to these details, you can work to protect your important information so that it does not fall into the wrong hands and avoid becoming a victim of an identity or financial crime.

Other items required for review include but are not limited to: sheds, walls, fencing, gates, pools, generators and any changes to the materials, colors, or appearance of a structure. Maintenance of existing materials is fine. Finally, any proposed substantial movement or regrading of soil should come to the board/commission for review.

Recycling Reminders:

- All of your paper, aluminum cans and glass can be recycled in the marked containers behind Village Hall
- All items to be recycled must be loose and not in any type of bag
- All items must be dry and free from any leftover food or other contaminants

Acceptable Items for Recycling:

- **Paper:** newspaper, phone books, office/school paper, magazines, mail, hard/soft bound books, catalogs, brown paper bags, flattened cardboard
- Aluminum cans: beverage cans if a magnet does NOT stick to the can, it is aluminum
- Glass: beverage containers (beer bottles), food containers (pickle jars), candle jars, perfume and cologne bottles
