From the Office of the Mayor...

Fellow Residents:

Labor Day is upon us. Welcome to fall. Here is a summary of activity in the Village over the past few months.



New Clerk-Treasurer

Bernice Schreiber started as our new Clerk-Treasurer on July 1. Bernice is a certified public accountant who came to us with a wealth of knowledge and experience stemming from her eight years of service as fiscal officer at the Village of Bentleyville. Bernice hit the ground running after spending three weeks of on-the-job training with Janet Mulh during June.

Speaking of Janet, the Village was fortunate to have her eighteen years of dedicated service before leaving for Gates Mills for a full-time opportunity. Janet was honored for her years of service at the July Council meeting.

Finances

Generating sufficient revenues to pay our expenses continues to be a substantial challenge. As noted in the last edition of The Village Voice, we ran at an overall cash flow deficit of \$263,829 in calendar 2014. This was in line with our forecast and matched our projections when discussing the Safety and Service Levy that was passed at the end of 2013. Our entire effort at this juncture is to give ourselves the longest runway possible with our existing dollars and assets as we seek ways to supplement our revenue and trim expenses. Unfortunately, like virtually all municipal entities and private business, we have little to no control over such items as insurance, health care and similar items. As I said during my last newsletter, as we continue to search for solutions (and we welcome the input of anybody who might have ideas in this regard), it is important to remind everybody that the Village faces very real fiscal challenges. Deficit spending will catch up with us in time.

On a more positive note, we were able to refinance our Village Hall bonds at the end of June. The former bonds paid annual interest at the rate of 4%. We were able to refinance them at a rate of 2.66% with the right to refinance again in five years. While we do not anticipate a refinancing five years from now, we did not anticipate one five years ago either, when the bonds were originally issued. The market for these instruments improved dramatically from the Village's standpoint, however, over the five years following original issuance. We were able to capitalize in this change in the market by cutting our interest costs by over a third.

The Waite Hill Police Beat

Hello to all residents.

Now that summer is about gone, and the dreaded winter is just around the corner, we have to remember to take care with pedestrian traffic and school buses. Our Village has had an increase of traffic over the years. There have been a few incidents with crashes and near misses of pedestrians versus vehicles. We are trying to be diligent with the speeding vehicles on our roadways. Please contact us with any areas of concern that you may have.

We have received a few complaints of golf carts being operated on the roadways with children driving them. So everyone is aware, this type of vehicle is not permitted to be operated on our roadways. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me or anyone else at the police department.

This year, we have seen an increase in residents receiving scam letters in the mail, via email, and by telephone. If you are the recipient of anything suspicious, please do not hesitate to contact the police department for help verifying the legitimacy of any communications. There also have been scams involving threatening IRS calls that reference being sued if you do not cooperate with the phone caller. I personally received one of these calls and reported it to the Attorney General's Office.

Deer season is approaching fast, and they are already on the move throughout the Village. Unfortunately, the deer are not too traffic "savvy" and think they own the roads. So, please be extra careful when driving. While deer-involved crashes can occur anytime, most mishaps happen between the hours of 5:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. - 8:00 a.m. because deer are "crepuscular" meaning that they are most active at dawn and dusk. Defensive driving is the best way to avoid hitting these animals. Be particularly cautious at dusk and dawn when deer are the most active.

As many of you probably saw already, there were bear sightings in Kirtland around the area of Hobart Road. Please remember not to have pet food or other food products outside near your home. Usually, bears are more afraid of you and wander off when they see people; however, I'd rather discourage them than invite them to stay in the Village. They usually pass through by way of the river beds and creeks on various properties. You may remember, we have had a few bears walk through the Village over the years. Service Department and Road Program

Crack sealing of our roads will soon begin. This activity, together with significant repairs, has become the norm in virtually all surrounding communities as action is undertaken to prolong the life of those roads. Waite Hill is no exception in this regard. Our challenge is compounded by fact that, between having our share of the State of Ohio local government fund cut in half, the elimination of the estate tax in Ohio, and our annual deficits, there has been no source from which the Street Maintenance and Repair (SMR) Fund can be replenished. Though SMR does have a current balance, it is not expected that the balance will last more than a few years as repairs increase and, ultimately, some roads will need to be replaced.

Council and I have just begun to explore funding alternatives for roads. Stay tuned as data is gathered and details begin to take shape.

Police and Safety

There have been several occurrences of crime in neighboring communities over the past several months. This leads Chief DeWitt and me to remind you that, even in Waite Hill, you can never be too careful. Take the customary precautions to ensure your safety. Keep your doors and windows secure, use your alarm systems and, most importantly, do not hesitate to report suspicious activity or circumstances. You can never be too safe in this ever-changing world of ours.

We will be offering flu shots at Village Hall. Please look for a flyer in your mailbox with details in the near future. Additionally, if you are in need of help with disposing expired prescription drugs, please contact Chief DeWitt for more details.
