Now that winter is almost over, we have to remember to take care with pedestrian traffic as we approach spring. Our Village has had an increase of bicyclists and joggers over the years. There have been a few incidents with bicycle crashes and near misses of pedestrians versus vehicles.

The other major concern is the inattention of drivers due to texting or talking on cell phones. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has found that texting while driving has increased dramatically.

The NHTSA has conducted a phone survey among 6,000 drivers above the age of 18 and found that 18 percent admitted to sending emails or text messages while behind the wheel. Among drivers between the ages of 21 to 24, approximately 50 percent admit to sending texts while driving.
