Please Note: On May 11<sup>th</sup>, Hobart Road will be closed to regular vehicular traffic from Eagle Road to South Lane for a special event between the hours of 4:30 p.m. – 9:30 p.m. Emergency vehicles and any resident that lives within the closure will have access.

### From the Office of the Mayor

Greetings to all. With spring upon us, we have an opportunity to update our residents on the latest activities of the Village.

#### Road Assessment

Our Village Engineer has finalized its Pavement Evaluation. The Evaluation includes an assessment of the current condition of our roads, their expected remaining life and the expected annual cost to maintain, repair and replace them over the next ten years. The Evaluation also considers the capital costs that are incurred by the Village in maintaining the roads as a part of our annual maintenance program.

From a big picture perspective, the projected cost to repair, maintain and replace our roads over the next ten years is approximately \$3.23 million, or an annual average of \$323,000 per year.

We continually strive to stay on the front of road maintenance and repairs so that we can extend their lives to 15 years (and beyond) but as you can see, the projected expense is a substantial one. We are also looking at various material

alternatives that might cut our costs without sacrificing functional quality or duration of road life. Our challenge now is to figure out how to fund those anticipated expenditures.

The Pavement Evaluation is posted on the Village website and we invite your review and comment. We are always looking for any thoughts or suggestions that you may have.

#### Road Projects

This summer, we will likely be involved in paving projects on sections of those roads in most need of repair. Fortunately, this past winter was milder than usual and did not take its customary toll on the roads.

Replacement of sections of Waite Hill Road and Metcalf Road is currently under active discussion, though no final decisions have been made. Consistent with past years, replacements will be supplemented by crack sealing and other maintenance work.

#### Bridge Update

We recently received our bridge inspection from the Lake County Engineer's Office. That office is the governmental entity responsible for oversight, testing, maintenance, repair and replacement of all bridges in the County. A copy of the report summarizing their findings is posted on the Village website.

As we have previously communicated, the Markell Road and Waite Hill Road bridges will need to be replaced. At this time, replacement of those bridges remains on schedule for 2020 and 2021. Fortunately, the Village will not have any funding responsibility for either of these replacements.

We will continue to keep you apprised of all scheduling matters and other relevant details as they are formalized.

#### Refurbished Signs

Many have commented on the newly restored signs on some of our main roads signifying entry into the Village of Waite Hill. These signs have been masterfully restored by our Service Department personnel and make a nice first impression to those passing through the Village. #### Car Show and Village Picnic/Halloween

### The Waite Hill Police Beat



Hello to all residents.

Now that spring is here, we have to remember to take care with pedestrian traffic. Our Village has had an increase of bicyclists, walkers and joggers over the years. We have installed LED solar stop signs on Eagle Road at Hobart Road and Metcalf Road. We are trying to be diligent with the speeding vehicles on our roadways and vehicles that are not stopping at stop signs causing crashes. Recently, we investigated two serious crashes at the intersection of Eagle Road and Hobart Road. Due to the severity of both, we conducted a traffic survey to see if this intersection was in need of four-way stop signs. Our study, which includes requirements of the state, resulted in not meeting the elements so we decided to at least try and make both intersections more visible. We were able to utilize a grant for all the new signs.

I know I have been very redundant about the increase with residents receiving scam letters in the mail, via email, and by telephone. If you are the recipient of anything suspicious, please do not hesitate to contact the police department for help verifying the legitimacy of any communications. Again, one of the biggest scams is the threatening IRS calls. Also, there has been an increase of individuals posing as utility workers showing up at your door stating that they need to conduct as service at your residence and try to gain access to your home. If you have this happen, call us immediately.

As a reminder, our surrounding communities are experiencing multiple thefts and break-ins, so please be diligent in keeping your vehicle and home locked. The best deterrents are alarm systems and well-lit properties. Motion lights seem to help when you have them at the four corners of your home.
